On behalf of the Managing Committee, Mr. Hemant Bhalekar, Hon. President of the David Sassoon Library and Reading Room, welcomed the members present at the 172nd Annual General Meeting of the Library.

In his address, Mr. Hemant Bhalekar stated that the last AGM was held in August 2019. For the year 2020, the AGM had been planned for August–September; however, it could not be held due to the guidelines issued by the Government of Maharashtra. Subsequently, a letter was written to the Charity Commissioner seeking advice on how to conduct the AGM in such a scenario.

Before commencing the business of the AGM, the house rose and sang the National Anthem.

While narrating the difficulties faced during the pandemic of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in our country, the Hon. President informed the house of the sad demise of our valuable members in 2020, namely Mr. Kiran Nagarkar, Mr. Navinchandra Majithia, Mr. Ravinder B. Sareen, and Mr. Ravi Patwardhan. At the outset, the house observed two minutes' silence as a tribute to the departed souls. All members recalled the valuable services rendered by the departed members. The Hon. President specifically remembered the contribution of Mr. Ravinder Sareen, who had assisted in obtaining land records from the Land Record Office. Ms. Swati Kapadia, Ex-Secretary and Life Member, also recalled that the library was able to secure more contributions due to his efforts.

The Hon. President further stated that during the year, the David Sassoon Library celebrated its 153rd Foundation Day in the Library Garden. He noted that the library had remained closed from 21st March 2020 on account of COVID-19 and was reopened only in the last week of October 2020, in compliance with the SOP guidelines of the Government of Maharashtra. Initially, the library operated from 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM, which was later extended to 10:00 PM to meet the requirements of students.

He also explained the financial challenges faced during the pandemic. There was a severe financial crunch, and at one stage there were insufficient funds to pay staff salaries and utility bills, as all sources of revenue had stopped. Even so, the library managed to pay salaries in proportion—full salary for the first two months, followed by 75%, and then 50%. He urged all members to continue wearing masks and to maintain sanitizing and handwashing practices, especially as the second wave had already begun. He then requested Mr. Baldev Singh, Hon. Secretary, to proceed further in conducting the business of the meeting.

Accordingly, the agenda was taken up for review and approval. Meanwhile, Mr. Kaushik Oza, Hon. Life Member, expressed words of appreciation for the Managing Committee, acknowledging that even during the worst period of the pandemic in 2020, the Committee took care of the staff and ensured continuity. He emphasized that the institution had successfully overcome multiple challenges and stated that he was ready to extend his support to safeguard this august institution. He requested the members to give a standing ovation to the Committee for their dedication during such difficult times.

With the approval of the Chair, the agenda items were taken up and the following decisions were made:

Item No. 1 – To read and confirm the minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on Monday, 5th August 2019

The Secretary, Mr. Baldev Singh, proposed to read and confirm the minutes of the Annual General Meeting held in August 2019

Mr. Rajendra Yadav (Ordinary Member) intervened and stated that he had objections to the said minutes. He pointed out that, vide his application dated 22.07.2019, he had demanded a copy of the resolution approving the extension of the retirement age of the Peon staff of the library from 60 to 65 years, but the same had not been provided to him.

In response, the Chair explained that the main reason for granting the extension was to retain the experienced staff who were due to retire in 2016, at a time when all the office bearers of the Managing Committee, except the Vice President, had abruptly resigned. In that situation, retaining such experienced staff, who were well-versed with the records and day-to-day work of the library, was essential to ensure continuity and smooth functioning. The Hon. President, Mr. Hemant Bhalekar, further informed the house that the said peons had subsequently retired two years ago for personal reasons. Hence, this matter stood closed, and no further discussion was warranted.

Despite this clarification, Mr. Rajendra Yadav continued to insist on receiving a certified copy of the resolution increasing the retirement age from 60 to 65 years. At this point, Ms. Swati Kapadia, Ex-Secretary and Life Member, intervened and remarked that Mr. Yadav had already acknowledged the matter earlier. She further explained that while his objection may have been reasonable at the time, raising it again was not necessary. She suggested that if he wished, his views could be formally recorded in the minutes but requested him to cooperate as many important issues still remained to be discussed.

Following the replies of the Hon. President and other members, Agenda Item No. 1 was unanimously passed, proposed by Mr. Kaushik Oza (Life Member) and seconded by Ms. Kavita Solunke (Life Member).

Item No. 2 – To read, consider and adopt the Audited Statement of Accounts, Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account, and Auditor’s Report for the year ended 31st March 2020

The Audited Statement of Accounts, Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account, and Auditor’s Report for the year ended 31st March 2020 were read, considered, and adopted unanimously, proposed by Ms. Swati Kapadia (Life Member) and seconded by Mr. Asif Khatri (Life Member).

During the discussion, Mr. Yogesh Shah (Life Member) remarked that he had been associated with the library since his college days. He suggested that the proposed sanction of Rs. 1,25,000/- for the purchase of books was too little.

Mr. Asif Khatri raised an objection regarding the existing penalty of Rs. 1/- per day for not returning books on time. He suggested that it be reduced to 50 paise per day to encourage readers.

In response, Mr. Vaibhav Haldankar (Hon. Treasurer) explained that the levy of a penalty was not for financial gain but to ensure timely return of books so that other members could have access to

them. He further clarified that members who wished to keep a book for a longer period could extend the due date through various modes such as WhatsApp, SMS, or telephone. He emphasized that Rs. 1/- was a nominal amount and that the intention behind the penalty was to inculcate the habit of timely returns.

Mr. Baldev Singh (Hon. Secretary) also reiterated the importance of returning books on time and thanked members for the healthy discussion. Mr. Arvind Dave (Life Member) encouraged members to read more and clear the racks to allow circulation of books.

Mr. Asif Khatri further suggested that members should be informed about new book purchases so that they could make use of them. He proposed that this information be updated on the website from time to time and recommended that library reading hours be extended, since the situation had improved compared to the earlier months. The Hon. Secretary assured members that these suggestions would be duly considered. The discussion was then concluded.

Item No. 4 – To consider and, if thought fit, to pass with or without modification, the following resolution:

“RESOLVED THAT M/s. Ambalal Thakkar & Associates, Chartered Accountants, be and are hereby appointed as auditors to audit the accounts of the library for the year 2020–21 at a remuneration of Rs. 7,500/- (Rupees Seven Thousand Five Hundred Only), plus out-of-pocket expenses not exceeding Rs. 1,500/- (Rupees One Thousand Five Hundred Only), together with Goods and Services Tax as applicable.”

The resolution was proposed by Mr. Asif Khatri and seconded by Mr. Arvind Dave which was passed unanimously by the House.

Special Business

Item No. 5 – To consider and, if thought fit, to pass with or without modification, the following resolution:

“RESOLVED THAT an ex-gratia payment equivalent to 1 (One) month’s Basic Pay and Dearness Allowance be made to the permanent staff for the year 2019–2020.”

The resolution was proposed by Mr. Deepak Sawant, seconded by Ms. Harsha Purohit, and was passed unanimously by the House.

Item No. 6 – To consider and adopt the Conservation Report of the Conservation Architect & Historic Building Consultant, M/s. Abha Narain Lambah Associates, for the restoration, repairs, and adaptive reuse of the library, and to authorize the Managing Committee of the Library to get the work carried out as per the said report.

Mr. Vaibhav Haldankar (Hon. Treasurer) clarified that the restoration work of the library building is likely to commence soon. He noted that for the last 15 years no significant restoration or repair work had been undertaken. The initial estimated budget for the restoration project is approximately Rs. 4.25 Crore. A copy of the restoration report was made available on the desk for review by the members.

The resolution was proposed by Ms. Kavita Solunke (Life Member), seconded by Mr. Vaibhav Chaurasia (Life Member), and passed unanimously.

Item No. 7 – To consider and adopt the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) dated 11.03.2020 between JSW Foundation and David Sassoon Library & Reading Room

Mr. Vaibhav Haldankar (Hon. Treasurer) explained that a major portion of the expenses would be incurred on roof restoration. Out of the total budgeted amount, an estimated minimum of Rs. 1 Crore will be required for this purpose. Based on the research conducted by the Library's Architect, it was noted that the original roof had a sloping design. At present, the roof is flat, resulting in rainwater accumulation and leakage problems. As part of the forthcoming restoration, the plan is to reinstate a sloping roof, subject to approval from the Heritage Committee.

He further informed the house that, as per the MOU, JSW Foundation has agreed to bear the entire project cost, including architect fees, not exceeding Rs. 3,00,00,000/- (Rupees Three Crores Only). All payments will be made directly by JSW Foundation, and no funds will be received in the library's bank account. Copies of the MOU were made available for review, should any member seek clarification.

At this point, Mr. Rajendra Yadav (Ordinary Member) raised an objection. Being a practicing lawyer, he insisted on receiving a personal copy of the MOU and wished to examine its contents. In response, Mr. Vaibhav Haldankar (Hon. Treasurer) explained that the MOU was a confidential document involving multiple parties, and therefore, without their consent, it could not be circulated among members. However, to maintain transparency, he read out the entire contents of the MOU to the house, enabling members to fully understand its provisions.

He further assured the members that the project cost would not exceed Rs. 3 Crore and that the restoration work was expected to be completed within three years, with an effort to finish within two years if possible.

In response to a query from Mr. Rajendra Yadav regarding the period for which the library would remain closed during the restoration work, the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Baldev Singh, clarified that the safety of members would be the primary consideration. He assured the house that alternative arrangements would be made wherever possible and that the Committee would strive to minimize closure time for members' convenience.

Ms. Swati Kapadia (Life Member) intervened, noting that the matter under discussion was primarily related to the funds allocated for the restoration project. She stated that before the commencement of work, the Hon. Committee would present a clear time frame for completion of the restoration. She acknowledged that such a large-scale project could not be completed overnight and clarified that whether the period was two or three years, it would not hamper the library's services. She emphasized that the work must begin once the contractor is finalized.

Mr. Pramod Dhoble (Life Member) raised certain points for consideration:

1. The MOU mentions a three-year time frame; however, he suggested that this period should be finalized only after obtaining all the necessary permissions, as delays in permissions could impact the timeline.
2. The cost of the project was said to be inclusive of litigation expenses. He expressed concern that, in case any PIL (Public Interest Litigation) is filed in court, legal expenses might be included under JSW's scope. He suggested that such expenses should not be indemnified or included in the library's liability.
3. He sought clarity on the overall project cost of Rs. 3 Crore and raised the concern of what would happen in case of a cost overrun.

In response, President Mr. Hemant Bhalekar clarified that the Committee hoped the project would be completed within the sanctioned budget. However, if there was any cost overrun, the library could approach other sources for funding.

Thereafter, the proposal for carrying out the restoration work by JSW Foundation as per the terms and conditions of the MOU was unanimously passed by the House.

On further doubts raised by Mr. Rajendra Yadav, Mr. Vaibhav Chaurasia (Life Member) intervened, observing that the Managing Committee was making every effort to ensure the restoration was carried out, particularly the critical task of roof repairs. He stressed that obtaining an MOU worth Rs. 3 Crores was not an easy task and required enormous effort, which should be duly appreciated.

President Mr. Hemant Bhalekar added that the MOU had been signed by him, with Ex-Secretary Ms. Swati Kapadia present at the time, ensuring complete transparency. He reiterated that nothing was hidden from members.

Ms. Swati Kapadia again intervened, acknowledging that every member had the right to seek clarification. However, as the MOU involved two parties, the consent of both was necessary before sharing copies. The responsibility was binding on the library, and therefore the MOU could not be circulated. She assured that any member could go through the content of the MOU, and if a member insisted on raising objections, their views could be recorded in the minutes.

Mr. Kaushik Oza (Life Member) expressed apprehension about whether signing the MOU imposed any hidden conditions on the library. In response, Hon. Secretary Mr. Baldev Singh assured the House that there were no conditions binding the Library under the MOU.

Mr. Kaushik Oza then appreciated the Managing Committee for their efforts in securing an MOU worth Rs. 3 Crores for restoration work.

Finally, Mr. Pramod Dhoble reiterated that a copy of the MOU should be placed before the Committee for review. He clarified that his concerns should not be misinterpreted as questioning the integrity of the Committee, which he did not doubt.

A member suggested installing solar panels on the roof to reduce power costs, estimating potential savings of Rs. 25,000/- to Rs. 30,000/-. In response, Hon. Secretary Mr. Baldev Singh stated that no changes could be made to the scope of work, which mandates a sloped roof. Moreover, as the library is a Heritage Grade I structure, modifications to the main structure are not permitted. Therefore, installing solar panels on the roof is not possible.

Incidental Item (Not included in the Agenda)

The Hon. President, on behalf of the Committee, announced that the staff members who had previously been granted an extension of retirement age from 60 to 65 years were now retiring. He highlighted the importance of registering the library's gratitude for their dedicated service of over 40 years, often with minimal salary.

He recalled that in 1991, there was no formal salary structure, and the monthly remuneration for staff was very meagre. Mr. Ramesh Ghorpade, Mr. Ramesh Gurav, and Mr. Sunil Patil had provided long-standing service under challenging circumstances. He also noted that during the tenure of Mr. Vivekanand Ajgaonkar on the Managing Committee, three office bearers resigned, causing disruption to Library operations. This had necessitated the temporary increase of retirement age to retain experienced staff, whose term has now been completed.

The Hon. President acknowledged that these staff members had supported the library even during the lockdown period, sometimes with half salary. He requested all members to give a standing ovation to Mr. Sunil Patil, Mr. Ramesh Ghorpade, and Mr. Ramesh Gurav in recognition of their 40 years of dedicated service. The retiring staff were felicitated by the Managing Committee and members, although Mr. Ramesh Ghorpade could not be present due to illness.

Hon. President Mr. Hemant Bhalekar recalled that Mr. Ramesh Ghorpade, though a Head Clerk, performed all office duties diligently and without hesitation. He praised his handwriting and efficiency, noting that he had been the only clerk available at the time and had been a great support in official work.

Each retiring staff member was gifted Rs. 5,001/- by the Managing Committee in gratitude for their service. The President also highlighted that Mr. Sunil Patil's family had served the library for 80 years, with his father having been a former staff member. He proudly noted that the children of these retiring staff members had gone on to become Engineers and MBAs.

Mr. Vaibhav Chaurasia, in a personal gesture of appreciation, contributed Rs. 11,000/- to each of the retiring staff. Mr. Kaushik Oza further recalled that Mr. Chaurasia had supported the library generously during times of difficulty, including a donation of Rs. 50,000/- for Library welfare. The members acknowledged Mr. Vaibhav Chaurasia's benevolence with applause.

Item No. 8 – To transact such other business as may be brought forward by any member before the meeting

Private Resolutions

1. Resolution for the Fiber Internet Connection

Proposed by : Mr. Asif Khatri (Life Member)

Seconded by : Mr. Yatin R. Shah (Life Member)

Mr. Asif Khatri proposed that the current internet connection was not providing optimum connectivity and requested that it be upgraded to a fiber internet connection for better speed and reliability. In response, the Hon. President clarified that the library already has 4G fiber internet connectivity and assured the house that the Committee would look into further upgrades to improve the speed.

2. Resolution to Allow Library Members to Stand for Elections for Four Consecutive Terms

Proposed by : Ms. Kavita Solunke (Life Member)

Seconded by : Mr. Prasad Zagade (Life Member)

Ms. Kavita Solunke stated that the current Managing Committee, together with JSW Foundation, had made significant efforts to repair the library building by entering into an agreement with JSW Foundation, securing Rs. 3 Crores in funding for the project.

As the third term of the current Committee was nearing completion, she proposed that the members of the present Committee be allowed to contest elections for one additional consecutive term to ensure continuity and proper execution of the restoration project. She noted that similar proposals had been made and approved in the past.

The proposal suggested that every eligible member should be allowed to contest for a consecutive fourth term. While most members supported the proposal, a few members raised objections.

Ms. Swati Kapadia (Life Member) expressed that the present Committee should be allowed to

continue and that they should be permitted to take a call on the matter. She further suggested that whether contesting for a fourth consecutive term is legally permissible should be explored.

Mr. Rajendra Yadav (Ordinary Member) objected to the proposal, stating that as per the bye-laws, a committee could not be extended in this manner. Mr. Hariram Chaudhari commented that seeking a fourth term was risky, and even if the resolution were passed, it would be illegal. He emphasized that other members should also be allowed to contest elections.

In response, Hon. Secretary Mr. Baldev Singh clarified that the wording of the private resolution did not prevent any member from contesting elections. The resolution proposed only increasing the consecutive term limit from three to four terms for all eligible members, including current Managing Committee members.

After extensive discussion, the majority of members suggested that the proposal should be put to a vote. Mr. Kaushik Oza urged the house not to allow the matter to create division and recommended withdrawing the private resolution.

Ms. Kavita Solunke (Life Member) clarified that the proposal was not for extending the tenure of the current Committee but for allowing current Committee members to contest the forthcoming elections to the Managing Committee, given the critical stage of the library restoration project. Mr. Vaibhav Chaurasia expressed support, stating that this Committee was one of the most effective in progressing the library's work, and he registered his opinion in favour of allowing the Committee members to contest a fourth term.

The House agreed to vote on whether eligible members should be allowed to contest elections consecutively for four terms. Members were asked to raise their hands in support. Thirty-eight members voted in favour, and four members voted against. Accordingly, the resolution to allow eligible members, including current Managing Committee members, to contest for a fourth consecutive term was passed by majority.

3. Resolution to Conduct Managing Committee Elections as per the Constitution of the Library

Proposed by : Mr. Rajendra Yadav (Ordinary Member)

Seconded by : Mr. Yatin Shah (Life Member)

Mr. Rajendra Yadav proposed that a Special Election Officer be authorized to supervise the duties of the Returning Officer appointed by the Managing Committee. He suggested that the Special Election Officer should be a member with at least 15 years of membership.

Most members opposed this proposal. Mr. Arvind Dave noted that it was technically not viable. Mr. Vaibhav Chaurasia, along with other members, expressed confidence in the Managing Committee and stated that appointing a Special Election Officer was unnecessary. Mr. Kunal Ved (Life Member

and Managing Committee) intervened, emphasizing that no member should threaten the Committee, noting that Committee members had worked diligently even during the COVID-19 pandemic, often sacrificing personal time, to take care of the library under challenging circumstances.

Mr. Rajendra Yadav clarified that he had not threatened anyone.

Ms. Swati Kapadia (Life Member) expressed the solidarity of the members of this august library, emphasizing that while individual members may come and go, the legacy of the library must be conserved forever. She noted that many former members of the library had gone on to become IAS, IPS officers, and achieved success in other fields. She expressed pride in being associated with this institution. Several other members also recalled their experiences and expressed gratitude to the library for helping them gain knowledge and achieve personal and professional growth.

However, it was noted that the private resolution discussed was declared invalid, as the seconder, Mr. Yatin Shah (Life Member), was not present in the House.

4. Resolution to Appoint Advocate for Pending Court Proceedings

Proposed by : Mr. Rajendra Yadav (Ordinary Member)

Seconded by : Mr. Yatin Shah (Life Member)

Mr. Rajendra Yadav proposed that he be appointed as an advocate to appear in the pending proceedings before the Small Causes Court, Mumbai, Court Room No. 19, in Rent Act Eviction Suit No. 1161 of 1986, without any consideration. He stated that he was willing to provide his legal services free of cost, noting that the case had been pending for the past 15–20 years.

The Hon. Chair observed that the matter required detailed discussion and consensus before any decision could be finalized.

At the conclusion of the 172nd Annual General Meeting, all participants were served light refreshments.

As desired by the Hon. President, the Hon. Secretary conveyed a vote of thanks to all participants for their cooperation and support in conducting the Annual General Meeting.

The 172nd Annual General Meeting of the David Sassoon Library & Reading Room was thus concluded.

Financial Year 2024-25 Significant Accounting Policies and General Notes

1. Origin & Management

The institution was originally a society in the name and style of The Sassoon Mechanics Institute registered at Bombay under act 21 of 1860 of the Legislative Council of the Governor General of India which was later on registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. On 4th April 1863 its name was changed to David Sassoon Library & Reading Room and was registered as such. After the promulgation of Bombay Trust Act 1950 allcharitable entities hitherto un-registered or registered under any statute were brought under the ambit of this act, and consequently, on 26th May 1953 the said society was registered under this Act. Under the present circumstances, the affairs of the institution are managed by the managing committee which is duly elected body and is vested with all the duties and powers to manage all day to day affairs and the internal affairs are governed by a set of rules and bye laws formed by the institution.

2. Method of Accounting

A. Accounting System

The accounts are maintained to comply in all material aspects with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, the statutory accounting standards and the relevant provision of the trust and revenue laws. The institution follows the cash system of accounting.

B. Revenue Recognition

All revenue is recognized on receipts and similarly expenses whether capital or revenue, are recorded on actual payment.

C. Library Membership Fees

a) Patron Membership

Patron membership fees received are non-refundable and are directly credited to patron funds. During the year under audit, the library has not received any subscriptions towards patron membership

b) Life Membership

Life membership fees received are non-refundable and are directly credited to life membership subscription fund. During the year subscriptions amounting to Rs. 1,00,000/-were received towards life memberships.

c) Ordinary Memberships

Ordinary membership fees (except deposits) are credited to income and expenditure accounts annually.

d) Temporary Memberships

These are fees received from temporary members up to 45 days. These are credited to income and expenditure accounts.

D. Other Revenues

- a) Locker fees received from locker donated by Mr. Ramchandani are not treated as revenue but are directly transferred to specific reserves created, which is in compliance with the specific instructions of the donor. Locker fees received from other library lockers are however credited to the revenue account.
- b) Interest received on Investment made out of Building repair fund, is not credited to the revenue but directly credited in the said fund as per past precedents.
- c) Similar interest received from investment made out of provident fund accumulations, are directly credited in provident fund.
- d) Interest or dividend income on investment of cumulative nature, including investment out of provident fund account is accounted on the receipt of the same.
- e) The library charges a fine on books tendered late and on lost books, recovers an amount which is double the recorded value of books. These fines are credited to the revenue account on receipt. However, out of the total fines charged for the lost books, an amount equal to the cost of the book should be credited to books of account to offset the misrepresentation of book value of books. However, issuance of books to the member has been stop on account of library renovation. No fine has been received during the F Y 2024-25.

E. Prior period items

- a) The institution maintains its book of account on the cash basis of accounting. Consequently, revenue is recognized on receipt and similarly expenses whether capital or revenue, are recorded on actual payment, no provision for the same is made.
- b) The provident fund account is showing an amount of Rs. 5,54,183.34/-receivable from the library.

3. Donations

a) General donations

All amounts received as general donations i.e., non-corporate and non-specific donations, are accounted as donations income and credited to Income and Expenditure Account and

includes cash accumulations in the donation box. During the year contributions amounting to Rs. 11,05,601/- were received as general donations.

b) Corpus Donations

All amounts received as Corpus donations are capitalized to the Corpus Fund account which remains fixed and cannot be utilized. During the year NIL donations were received as corpus Donations. However separate bank account or specific investments are not created for corpus and specific donations. The management earmarks certain investments towards such donations, due to intermittent shortfall in funds. However specific investment pertains to such donations are eventually made upon achieving surplus of funds. However specific investments pertaining to such donation are eventually made upon achieving surplus of funds or maturities of existing investments.

c) Specific Donations

Donations received with specific instructions from the donors as to its utilization criteria are generally directly credited to a specific Accounts and the utilization of these funds are debited to this specific account. During the year following specific donations were received viz.:

6. Fixed Assets

- a. The movable and Immovable properties of the institution are shown at their historical cost of acquisition including any attributable costs.
- b. The original title or lease or property deeds in respect of the immovable properties namely, land, library building & Appurtenants thereto, are not available for our verification, except for a certified extract of the lease deed of the institution land only.
- c. As explained by the managing committee, the fixed assets of the institution have been physically verified by the managing committee during the year and no materials discrepancies were noticed on such verification.
- d. None of the fixed assets have been revalued during the year.

7. Depreciation

- a. Depreciation is provided in the books on the written down method. Full year's depreciation is provided on assets acquired during the year irrespective of their period of usage.
- b. The rates at which depreciation is provided on the fixed assets of the institution are, determined by the managing committee, in accordance with the past precedents.
- c. An amount @50%, on amount of additions only, to books account, is written off directly by crediting the book balance. The balance is carried forward years after in the Institution books. The amount so written off as above, is though shown in the fixed asset schedule of the Annual report of the institution, in the depreciation column, does not comprise of

any depreciation and does not get reflected in the total amount of depreciation debited to income and expenditure account.

- d. The managing committee is of the opinion that no depreciation is provided on such assets but depreciation on water cooler and locker, which are received as donations in kind, is however consistently provided for.
- e. No depreciation is provided on assets acquired out of specific donations received for purchase of such assets.
- f. The managing committee informs us that it has seen consistent policy of the institution not to provide for depreciation on building premises of the library.

8. **Provident Fund books**

The managing committee is of the opinion that the provident fund Act is not applicable to the institution. The following operating procedures however, are adopted by the institution for provident Fund matter-

- a. Provident fund @10% is deducted from the staff salaries and an equal amount is contribute by the institution and deposited in the PF accounts maintained with state bank of India.
- b. Interest Income from the PF funds investment is directly credited to the PF balance sheet.
- c. Separate books of accounts are maintained for PF and separate balance sheet, PF balance statement and staff outstanding statement is prepared and attached with the Annual report of the institution.
- d. The PF amounts so accumulated are invested and the income so realized is credited to the interest accounting PF balance Sheet.
- e. The staff is paid an interest @8% p.a. other net running Provident Fund balances on prorata basis, i.e. Provident Fund balances, net of the loans taken by the respective employees. This interest paid is adjusted against the income from the investments out of the PF account mentioned in point (d) above. Any Shortfall/ Excess is met / due from/to the library accounts.
- f. Earlier any shortfall in the PF accounts was shown as recoverable from the library account but from last year the managing committee decided to actually pay off this shortfall, year to year, from the library account. However, during the year again an amount of Rs. 5,54,183.34/- is shown receivable from library Account by the PF account, which pertains to accumulated revenue excess in the PF account whose corresponding receivable is not appearing in the library account.

9. **Encumbrances**

The matter of vacation of the Institution premises, partly occupied by M/s. Lund &Blackley on the ground floor, is pending under litigation.

Note on Restoration of David Sassoon Library and Reading Room

The journey of restoration of David Sassoon Library and Reading Room started from 2017 till 2019 were library committee approach to Architect Ms. AbhaNarainLambah for building restoration.

Finally, 11 March, 2020 the MoU signed with JSW Foundation and David Sassoon Library and Reading Room for restoration of interior and exterior of the library, a Grade I Heritage Building. The overall scope of work includes comprehensive architectural & interior design services for restoration of interior and exterior of the library. The MoU will be effective from the 11th March, 2020 and would remain in force for the maximum duration for 3 years. The term of the MoU may be extended further by parties for a mutually agreed period and mutually agreed terms and conditions. After signed on MoU imminently in the March 2020 the Corona Pandemic has been spread all over the country and Government of India has set up SOP and lockdown the Country till November, 2021, the restoration was could not start. After the gap of 2 years of MoU signed the restoration work started from February, 2022. The ICICI Foundation for Inclusive Growth has also extended their financial support to JSW Foundation in completion of Restoration of Library Building.

The David Sassoon Library and Reading Room was constructed in 1867. It is a Grade I Heritage building in the Kala Ghoda Art District and one of the oldest educational institutions in the Victorian Gothic and Art Deco Ensembles of Mumbai UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Key Highlights of the Restoration of David Sassoon Library

1. Rehousing Of Nearly 30,000 Books:

One of the significant aspects of this Restoration project is the rehousing of nearly 30,000 books in five languages; English, Marathi, Gujarati, Hindi & Kannada. The library's collection includes some of the oldest books on architecture and design which have now been accommodated in large bookshelves on the first floor of the reading room.

2. Restored Original Sloping Roof:

This was one of the critical aspects of this restoration project. During the library's renovation undertaken somewhere in 1960, its original sloping roof was replaced with reinforced cement concrete slab. The concrete slab had, over time, developed water leakage in the building. During the restoration effort, this concrete slab had to be strategically demolished and a new MS framed portal roof was erected with multiple layers of waterproofing and protection.

3. Restoration of Elegant Stone Exteriors & Stunning Interiors:

The library's exterior façade and stunning interiors have been restored through extensive and gentle process of stone-cleaning, pointing and protection with a sensitive façade coating material.

4. Recreated Original Minton Tile Flooring:

The library's restoration includes recreating the intricate Minton tile flooring. The newly restored library has retained a significant amount of its original Minton Tile flooring starting from the entrance foyer extending to the first floor covering the Reading Room and the Veranda.

5. Restoration of Historic Furniture:

The library possesses many pieces of period & historic furniture. This includes some interesting furniture pieces in the form of solid teak tables with Gothic elements and even some pieces of furniture inset with handmade ceramic tiles. All these furniture pieces are part of the legacy of the library's original builders.

6. Recreated Original Lighting Design:

The Library originally used gas lighting in the building before electricity was introduced. A lamp on the main staircase from the pre-electricity era has been recreated and placed in its original place.

7. Restoration of Library Garden:

The library has around 6000 sq.ft. attached lush green garden for exclusive use of its members and the same is being renovated. The renovation work of the garden is in the process.

Apart from entering into an MOU with JSW Foundation, the library had also collected donations from various patrons for the Restoration Project of the Library. The name and the amount of their donation are as follows:

As per the agreed terms with JSW Foundation, out of the above funds the library has made the payments to the Contractor and Architect of Rs. 1,03,91,761/- up to 31-03-2024. The balance expenditure towards restoration were incurred by JSW Foundation. Since the expenditure incurred on the library restoration has increased the value and life of the building, the management has decided to capitalised the said expenditure incurred by the library as well as JSW Foundation in the books of account based on the Certificate obtained from Architect certifying the cost of restoration project. Accordingly, during FY 2023-24, the expenditure towards restoration of the library were capitalised in following accounting head:

David Sassoon Library Restoration Report

As members, you know the pride we share in our Grade I heritage building at the heart of the Kala Ghoda Art District. For over 150 years, the David Sassoon Library and Reading Room have been a landmark of learning and community, built in the Venetian Gothic style and cherished by generations.

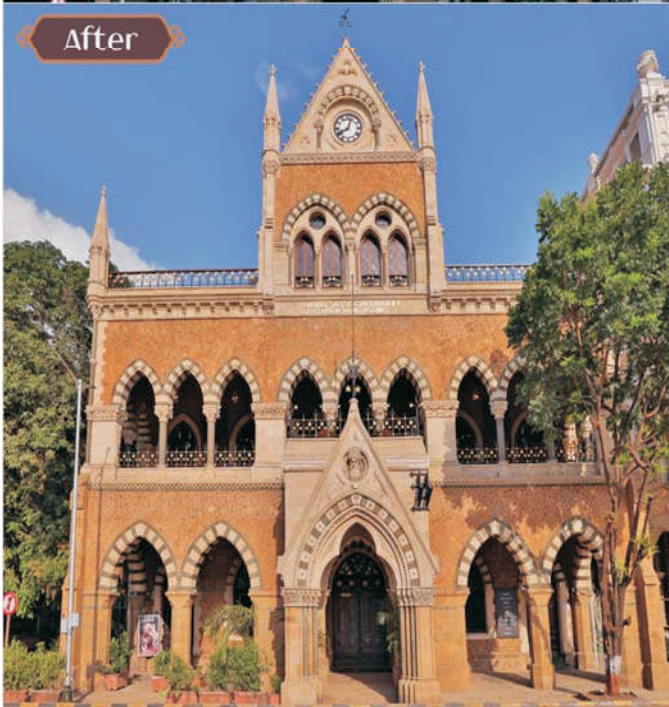
Over time, however, the building suffered due to the 1960s intervention of a flat RCC slab, which led to seepage and dampness, along with deterioration of the stone façade and internal walls. Many of you would recall the leaks and visible signs of damage that made restoration an urgent need.

A comprehensive conservation effort was therefore undertaken under the guidance of conservation architect Abha Narain Lambah Associates, generously supported by the JSW Foundation, ICICI Foundation For Inclusive Growth, Hermès India Retail & Distributors Pvt. Ltd., the Kala Ghoda Association, the Consulate General of Israel, Mumbai and The M. K. Tata Trust.

Over a period of nearly eighteen months, some of the most complex work was carried out, including dismantling the RCC slab, fabricating a new truss to reinstate the sloping roof, and restoring the gable walls and Gothic arch based on archival records. Skilled craftsmen and masons worked with traditional materials and techniques to ensure authenticity.

Today, the library stands renewed - its structural stability secured, its architectural character restored, and its legacy preserved for future generations of members.

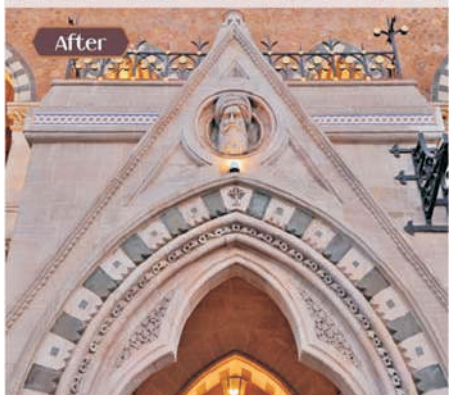
Exterior Restoration Excellence



Front Facade Revival

The external façade showcases intricate stonework and wrought iron detailing. It features a series of arches, polychromatic decoration using Malad Trachyte stone, Kurla Basalt, and Porbandar limestone, along with a high crocketed gable and corner pinnacles.

The facade had been heavily stained and damaged over the years. Restoration included cleaning, lime re-pointing, replacing deteriorated limestone artwork, and repairing ornamental railings. The original clock mechanism was also restored to working condition.

Welcoming Arcade

The very second element that the visitors admire as soon as they enter the library building are these elegant Kurla Basalt and Limestone arcades with a series of Gothic pointed arches with barrel vaults. The arcade is a common thoroughfare for the public to appreciate the Gothic architecture.

The existing condition of this surface had salt efflorescence, dry algae stains, missing pointing, and water leakage stains, which were restored by water jet cleaning and lime

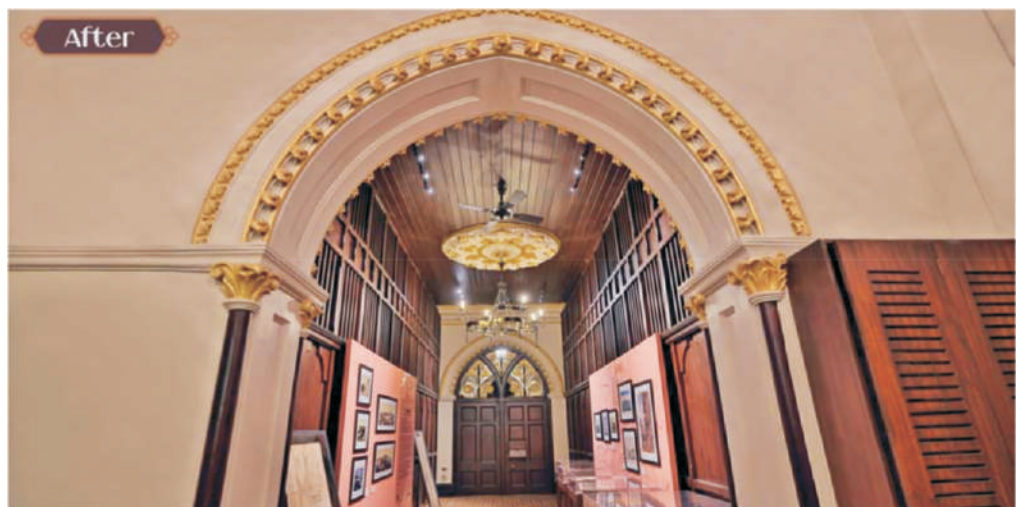

Grand Entrance Transformation

The grand entrance features wooden panelling and a Gothic-style arched doorway with intricate motifs. Years of water damage had dulled the beauty of the motifs and wooden pilasters.

Restoration involved carefully scraping away old paint, repainting motifs, and polishing wooden shafts to bring back their rich finish.



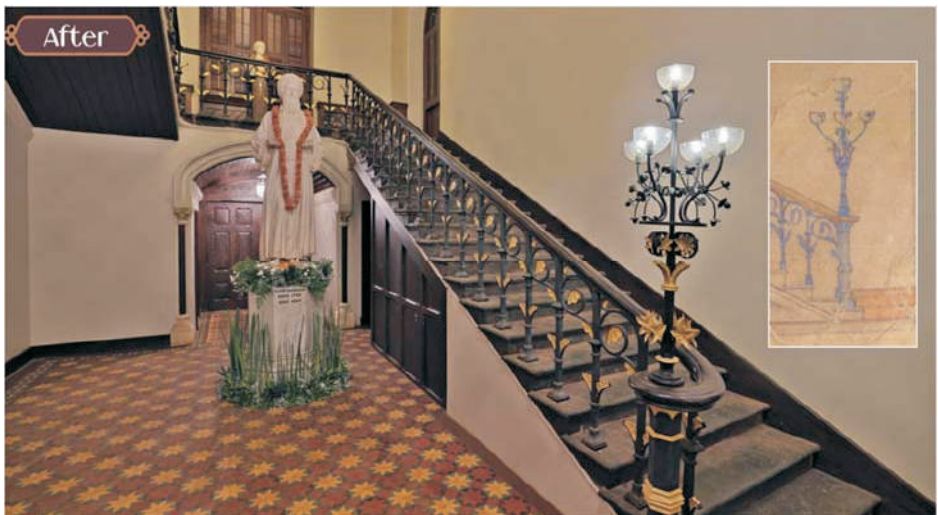
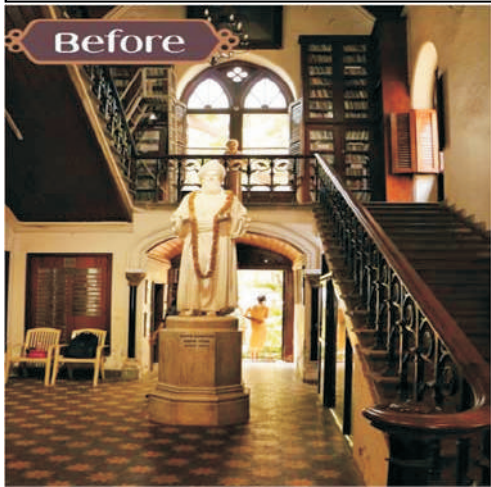

Heritage Staircase Lamp

The most unique feature is the heritage staircase lamp at the newelpost, recreated after detailed archival research. Skilled craftsmen brought this intricate lamp back to life, reviving an important heritage element that serves as a beacon for our members navigating the library.

Committee Room

Located at the mid-landing level, the Committee Room houses archival and exclusive books for our distinguished library members. This wood-panelled room contains the original white marble conference table.

The wooden ceiling and flooring were restored, while new storage cupboards were created with louvered shutters to match historic details. The antique chandelier and brass fittings were also restored.

Main Landing

The main floor landing, located just outside the grand reading room, serves as a welcoming reception and breakout space before one enters the hall. The area is distinguished by a beautifully restored wooden truss that crowns the space with character.

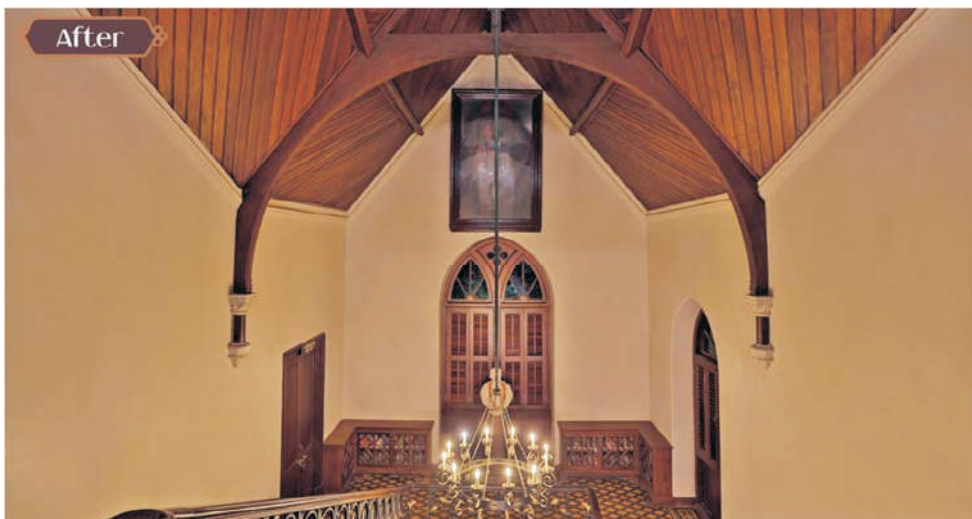
This section had previously suffered from flaking lime plaster, water stains, and peeling paint. The heritage railing along the staircase was carefully repaired and restored to preserve its original charm.

The centrepiece of the space is a custom-designed antique chandelier, which gracefully illuminates the entire area and enhances its timeless elegance.



Arch-Braced Truss

The staircase leading to the reading hall is crowned by a magnificent wooden arch-braced truss. Previously marred by dampness and leakage, the structure was carefully waterproofed and polished, preserving as much of the original timber as possible.

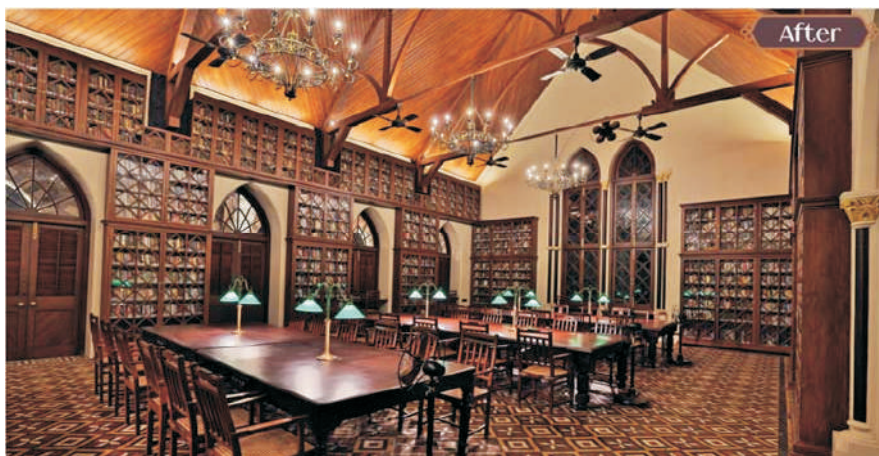
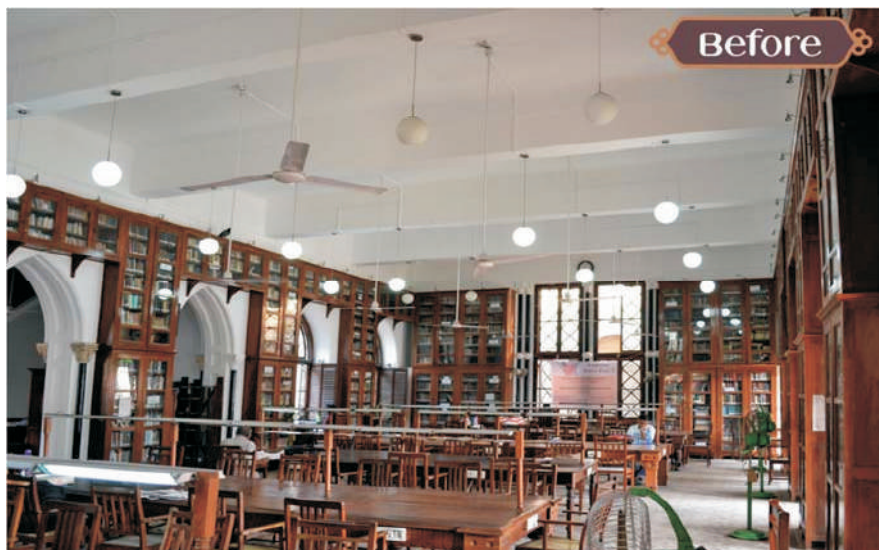

The Heart of Knowledge: Reading Room

The heart of the library, the Reading Room, features floor-to-ceiling teak cupboards, massive reading tables and Minton-patterned tile flooring - all meticulously restored for our library members' comfort and inspiration.

Water damage had decayed much of the earlier woodwork, but new cupboards were crafted in Burmese teak with diamond-style shutters. The original tables and chairs were restored and polished, maintaining their vintage charm for our members' daily use.

Architectural Marvel: Roof

Archival Research: Using archival images, the original hammer-beam truss design was carefully studied and documented to ensure historical accuracy.

Structural Recreation: The hammer-beam truss was recreated with steel supports, tongue-and-groove panels, and a matte finish that honours the original craftsmanship.

Problem Resolution: This reconstruction solved the long-standing problem of monsoon leakage, ensuring a dry and comfortable environment for our library members.

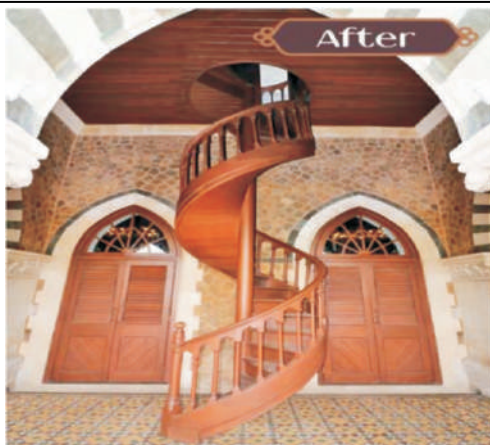
Pointed Arch Windows

Gothic-style arched windows with louvered shutters and cast-iron grills were restored on the west wall. These windows now serve as unique reading spaces for our library members. New wooden louvered shutters were made with brass hardware fittings and polished.



Spiral Staircase

The timber spiral staircase at the centre of the veranda is one of the library's most iconic Gothic features, carefully restored for safe member access.

Pitched Roof

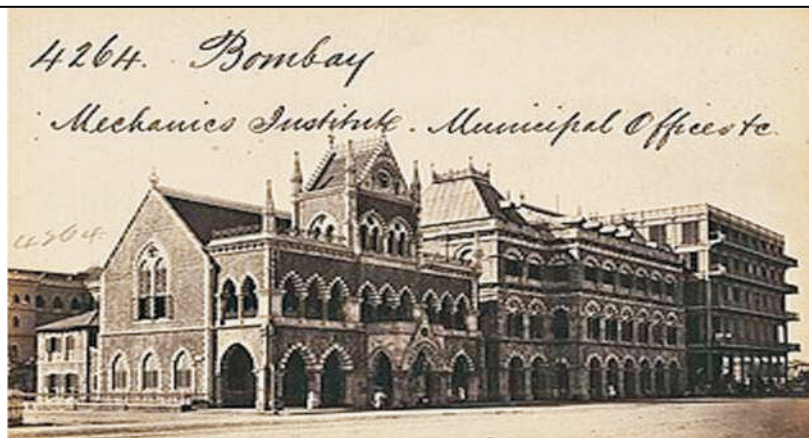
The roof restoration focused on resolving leakage and dampness issues caused by the RCC slab added in the 1960s. Based on archival references, the original pitched roof with an arched gable wall and finials was reinstated.

The RCC slab was dismantled with care to preserve the original structure, and a new truss with appropriate waterproofing was installed. Heritage details such as the cresting and finials were replicated to match the original design. The work was executed within a month, ensuring both structural stability and architectural authenticity.

Restoration of the Clock Tower Room

The historic clock tower, a defining element of the library's façade, was given special attention during the restoration. The original clock mechanism was carefully preserved, and the wooden sloping roof above it was repaired to reinstate its architectural character.

The work addressed algae growth, dampness, and major leakage problems, thereby safeguarding both the structure and its historic value. The restoration has ensured that this prominent landmark of the library continues to stand as a symbol of its legacy.



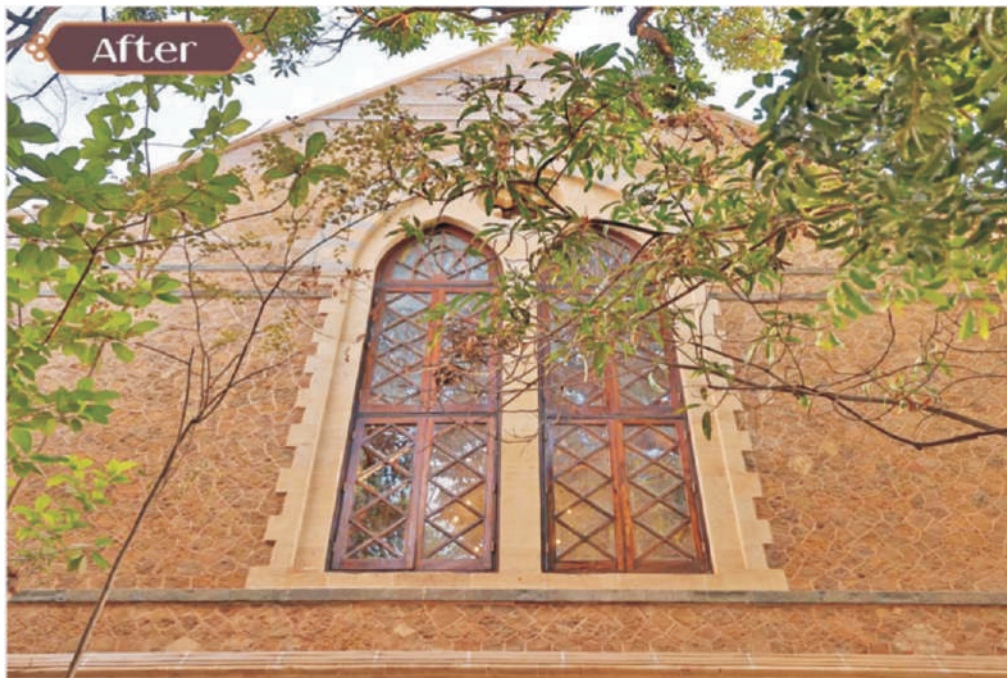
Reconstruction of the Gothic Arch and Gable Walls

One of the most challenging aspects of the restoration was the reconstruction of the Gothic pointed arch and the rubble stone gable walls on the south and north façades. These original features had been lost during the earlier RCC slab intervention, which had also removed the sloping roof and stone arch.

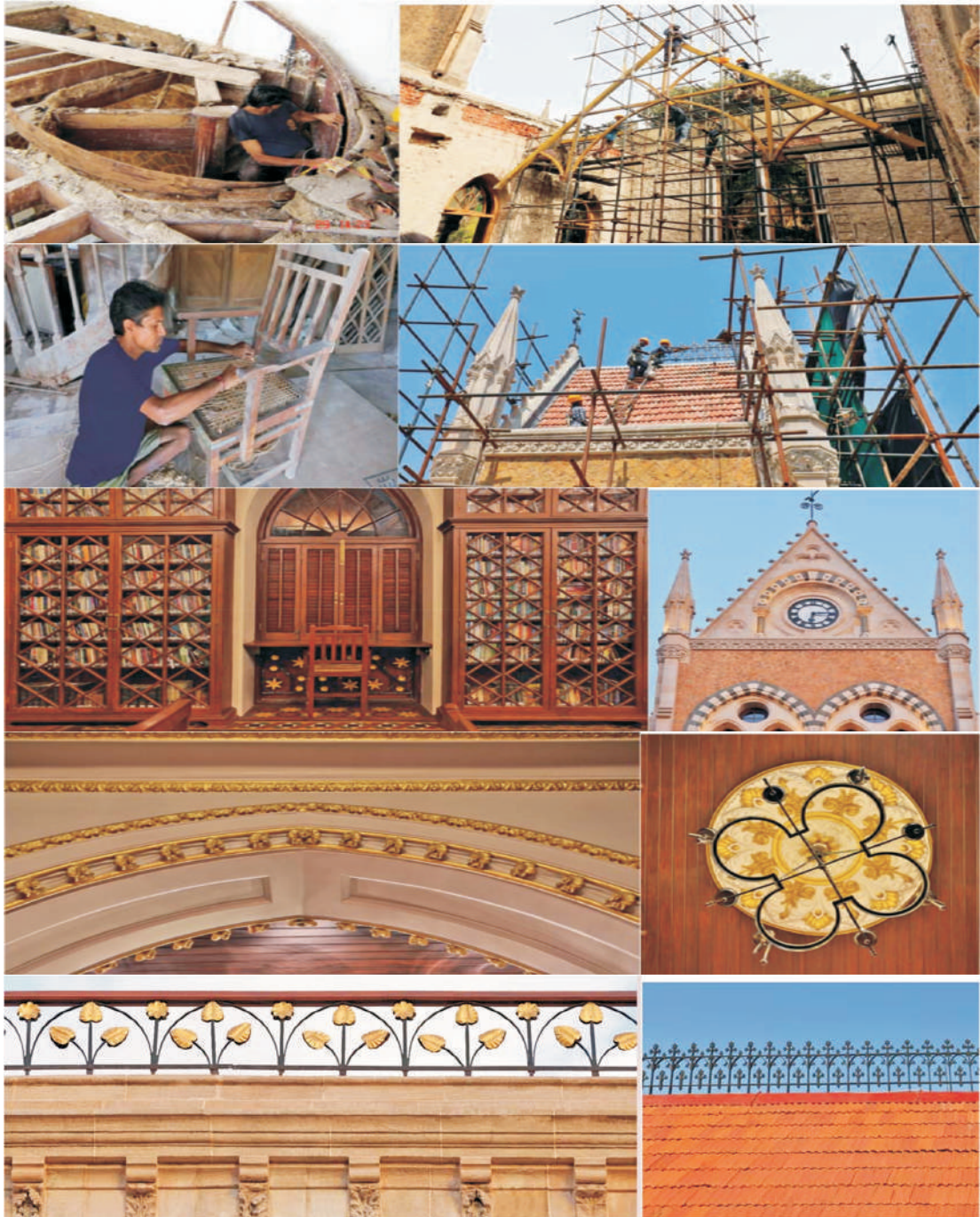
Skilled craftsmen worked over two months to recreate these features using Porbandar and Malad basalt, reinstating the library's original architectural character.
